"House Minority Leader Crystal Quade (D-Springfield) filed legislation Monday to ban companies from outside of the United States from owning Missouri farmland, according to the House Democratic Caucus. 'We want to make laws that invest in Missourians, not overseas corporate interests more concerned with extracting profit from one of our state's most valuable resources: its world-class farmland,' Quade said in a press release. Quade also said House Bill 707 will help Missouri's farmland legacy. 	February 2013: Kehoe Voted To Pass SB 9 To Allow Foreign Ownership Of Up To One Percent Of

<b>Missouri Farmland.</b> In February 2013, Kehoe voted to pass SB 9, "Modifies provisions relating to agriculture," according to records with the Missouri Senate. According to a summary of the legislation, "Generally, foreign businesses are prohibited from owning or having an interest in agricultural land, except as provided in sections 442.586 and 442.591. This act prohibits foreign businesses from owning agricultural land if the total aggregate foreign ownership of agricultural acreage in Missouri exceeds one percent of the total aggregate agricultural acreage. Such sale, transfer, or acquisition of any agricultural land must be approved by the director of the Department of Agriculture." SB 9 passed the Senate 23-9. [SB 9, Third Reading and Passed, 2/18/13]
• 2013: Kehoe Voted To Approve "Legislation Allowing Up To 1% Of Missouri's Farmland To Come Under Foreign Ownership." "Kehoe has come under fire from some of his gubernatorial opponents over his voting record in 2013, when lawmakers approved legislation allowing up to 1% of Missouri's farmland to come under foreign ownership. Although Gov. Jay Nixon vetoed the measure, lawmakers overrode his veto to ultimately pass the legislation. Kehoe was among the lawmakers who voted for the measure at the time. State Sen. Bill Eigel, who is running against Kehoe in the Republican gubernatorial primary, dubbed the lieutenant governor 'Kung Pao Kehoe' in a statement following the conference. 'This is a too little too late in-kind contribution from Mike Parson's government office to Kung Pao Kehoe's campaign to try to make up for the fact that they are losers on this issue,' Eigel said. 'They both voted to let foreign enemies buy Missouri land during their time in the Senate.'" [Columbia Daily Tribune, 1/4/24]
Kansas City Star: "[Kehoe] Said The 2013 Vote Had Been To 'Put A Cap On Foreign Ownership Of Land," Though "The Previous Cap Had Been Zero." "Kehoe is likely to face the most direct attacks on the issue because of his 2013 vote. During a February radio interview, he said the 2013 vote had been to 'put a cap on foreign ownership of land.' But while the bill did cap foreign ownership at 1%, the previous cap had been zero. The Chinese Communist Party's influence continues to grow and is one of the foremost national security threats to the United States, Kehoe said Thursday in a statement in response to questions from The Star. Missouri should be doing 'everything possible' to prevent the CCP and other foreign adversaries from buying Missouri farmland, especially around military installations, advanced manufacturing that plays a role in national defense and intelligence agencies, he said." September 2013: Kehoe Assumed The Chair And Voted To Override The Veto Of Jay Nixon On SB 9. In September 2013, Kehoe assumed the chair and voted to override Governor's veto on SB 9, "Modifies provisions relating to agriculture," according to records with the Missouri Senate. Jay Nixon's (D) Veto Of "A Bill Lifting A Near-Total Ban On Foreign Ownership Of Agricultural Land." "Former Democratic Gov. Jay Nixon in 2013 vetoed a bill lifting a near-total ban on foreign ownership of agricultural land but the Republican-controlled General Assembly overrode him allowing foreign entities to own up to 1% of agricultural land. In a statement, Kehoe called the order a 'critical step forward to protect Missourians, our military assets, and critical infrastructure against China and other foreign adversaries, all while respecting our strong relationships with international allies and economic partners.' Kehoe's Republican opponents for governor, Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft and state Sen. Bill Eigel, painted the order and press conference as intended to benefit Kehoe's</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>campaign. Both Republicans attacked Kehoe, who was a state senator in 2013 and supported the veto override but now backs new restrictions. Ashcroft on social media called the press conference 'incredibly disingenuous.' Eigel, in a statement, said the order was 'a too little too late in-kind contribution from Mike Parson's government office' to Kehoe's campaign. House Majority Leader Crystal Quade, a Springfield Democrat running for governor, said in a statement that Parson's order was 'a start,' but attacked Kehoe and Republicans for their 2013 votes." 	<b>Proposals In The Legislature Now Would Either Lower That Threshold To 0.5% Or Reimpose The Ban.</b> " "The veto override allowed foreign entities to own up to 1% of agricultural land and most proposals in the legislature now would either lower that threshold to 0.5% or reimpose the ban. Now, the major Republican candidates for governor all support tighter limits on foreign ownership or a new ban, reflecting how far the party has moved in 10 years. As the Republican Party nationally has shifted away from support for free trade and adopted an increasingly hawkish stance toward China, foreign land ownership has become a political liability - and opportunity - ahead of the 2024 election. Lt. Gov. Mike Kehoe was a state senator in 2013 and supported the veto override, but now backs new restrictions. Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft and state Sen.
